The Program: Frances Robb, independent scholar and member of the Alabama Humanities Foundation speaker's bureau will present "Snapshots and Snapshooters."





Frances Robb is a native of Birmingham, Alabama. She is a graduate of Birmingham Southern College and holds M.A. degrees from the University of North Carolina and Yale University. She taught history and humanities at Texas Christian University, the University of North Texas and the University of the South at Sewanee.

When Robb returned to Alabama with her family in 1986, she began a love affair with historic

photographs. Since then, she has been the curator for numerous exhibitions, lectured, presented workshops, and served as a consultant to museums, libraries and archives in Alabama and the Southeast. She is completing a book on the history of photography in Alabama and has another in the works on dating and identifying family photographs. As you might expect, historic photographs will illustrate her presentation.

## **Meet the New ECHS President**



Ann Biggs moved to Brewton in 1973 to join the faculty of the then Jefferson Davis Junior College (now Jefferson Davis Community College) as Assistant Librarian. Ann, who received a B.S. Degree from the University of South Alabama and an M.L.S. Degree from Florida State University, taught English and served as librarian at Escambia Academy in Canoe, AL prior to employment at the college..

Ann reports that as a newcomer her first year in Brewton, she attended a field trip sponsored by the Escambia County Historical Society to tour the Brooklyn Cave and to visit the circa 1868 A.A. McCreary Plantation home in Teddy, Alabama.


Thirty three years later is a long time to recall the particulars of that trip, but she reflects that it was her first contact with the Escambia County Historical Society. Ann observes the irony that she ended up marrying Mike Williams from Teddy, Alabama and now spends part of her time in that community in northeast Escambia County that she first visited with the historical society on that field trip!

The Escambia County Historical Society's archives were moved from the museum to the college library and there Ann assisted Society members and researchers with the Society's archives known as "The Alabama Room." When Ann, who eventually became Head Librarian at Jefferson Davis Community College, retired in 1997 she became a member of the Escambia County Historical Society and served as Vice-President in 1998, 1999, 2004, 2005. As Vice-President in those years, Ann planned programs for the Escambia County Historical Society and assisted Ed Seward who was president in 1998 & 1999 and Lynn Wixon, who was president in 2004 & 2005.

As Ann assumes the position of president for the Escambia County Historical Society, she reflects on the circle of life. Now, the Society's archives are located once again in the museum, rather than the library. Ann also comments that after years of helping **other** people research family history, she now has the time to work on **her** family history. In fact, Ann and her brother and cousin are planning a Biggs Family Reunion for the first weekend in June that will be attended by Biggs' relatives from a number of states.

Ann says she will be asking Society members to take an active role in their organization and invites their support and enthusiasm.

#### Reunion Honoring Magilbry and Dollie Findley

On March 12, 2005, the remains of Magilbry & Dollie Findley were buried at the Fairmount Cemetery in Red Level, Al. Descendants from as far away as Nevada, Arizona, Ohio, Virginia and many other states merged on this small town to honor their ancestors.

After fighting in the War of 1812, Magilbry moved from South Carolina to Georgia, finally settling in the Brooklyn/Red Leve/Loango area of Alabama. Magilbry and Dollie had ten children: William, John (Jack), Martin, Riley, Celia, Gillama, Bluford, Mary Ann, George and Martha Ann. On March 11, 2006, descendants of Magilbry and Dollie Findley will once again merge on Red Level, Alabama to honor their ancestors.

The Reunion will be held at Crystal Springs Park in Red Level beginning at 11 a.m. with a catered lunch at noon. The event will conclude with a ceremony at the gravesite.
